- 2. Request and a copy of records that would identify the patents granted to applications which were subject to secrecy orders that were rescinded in FY2017.

Your request is considered complete with full disclosure. However, you have the right to appeal this initial decision to the Deputy General Counsel, United States Patent and

Trademark Office, P.O. Box 1450, Alexandria, VA 22313-1450. An appeal must be received within <u>90</u> calendar days from the date of this letter. <u>See</u> 37 C.F.R. § 102.10(a). The appeal must be in writing. You must include a copy of your original request, this letter, and a statement of the reasons why the information should be made available and why this initial denial is in error. Both the letter and the envelope must be clearly marked "Freedom of Information Appeal."
